
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

A lifeboat slides down a ramp, into the water. The **volunteer** crew are going to help people in trouble at sea.






Lifeboat crew help to save people in an **emergency**. They find and rescue people in difficulty in the water.



What lifeboat crew do

Lifeboats are ready for action 24 hours a day. They help people at sea, on rivers, lakes and during floods.





Lifeboat crew must be able to work in all weather conditions. They must be able to work in the dark and in storms. All crew are trained in **first aid**.

At the station

Most lifeboat stations are on the **coast**. Some have **slipways**. This means the lifeboat can be **launched** quickly.





Coastguards keep an eye on all activity in British coastal waters. When there is an emergency at sea the coastguard officer calls the lifeboat station. The lifeboat is ready and waiting.

Emergency call

Most lifeboat crew are **volunteers**.

They have other jobs. They never know when they will get a call for help.






When a call comes, the crew rush to the lifeboat station. They get dressed and gather their **equipment**.

Lifeboat kit

Lifeboat crew wear special clothing to keep them warm and dry. They also wear boots and a safety helmet.






One of the most important pieces of kit is a **life jacket**. It keeps the crew member afloat in the water.

Lifeboats

Lifeboats must be fast, to reach people quickly. They are also strong. Some can flip themselves up again if they capsize.






Smaller **inflatable** lifeboats operate near the shore or in rivers. They rescue people from the water. Bigger lifeboats go further out to sea.

Saving lives

Many lifeboats have lights to help
the crew spot people in the water.
Lifeboats can pull other boats to safety
if they are damaged.





Lifeboats carry medical **equipment**.

The crew look after injured people.

They give **first aid** until other medical help arrives.

Lifeguards

Lifeguards and lifeboat crews often work together. Lifeguards patrol many beaches. They rescue swimmers who need help.





Lifeguards use small boats and jetskis to rescue people. They carry rescue tubes, ropes and life jackets. If more help is needed the lifeguards call the lifeboat station.

Teaching the public

Lifeboat crew and lifeguards sometimes visit schools. They talk to children about their jobs and explain how people can stay safe in the water.





You can visit many lifeboat stations.
The lifeboat crew will show you the lifeboat. They will tell you about the **equipment** and special clothing.

Staying safe

Beach safety:

- Only swim at beaches with lifeguards.
- Never go in the water if the red flag is up. A red flag means danger.
- A red-and-yellow flag tells you that a beach is safe.
- Never go into the water on your own.
- 🚱 If you need help, raise your hand and shout.
- If you see someone in trouble call 999 and ask for the coastguard.

Glossary

capsize flip over in the water coastguard organisation that patrols and protects coast the land next to the sea emergency serious situation, such as a fire or boat accident, that calls for fast action equipment items that a person needs to do their job

first aid emergency medical help given while waiting

inflatable small rubber or plastic boat filled with air

launched rolled into the water

lifeguard expert swimmer who keeps watch on people in the water

life jacket sleeveless jacket that keeps a person afloat in the water

patrol guard an area by making regular walks through it rescue tube foam-filled float carried by lifeguards

slipway a slope or ramp used for launching boats into the water

volunteer person who does a job without being paid
