Literacy and Reading

Marvellous minibeast texts: Superworm, Spinderella (Julia Donaldson), The very hungry caterpillar (Eric Carle), The big book of bugs (Yuval Zommer).

Research into different types of minibeasts (minibeast names) using a range of media - books/programmes/internet – Present what you have found in an interesting way (poster, video, factfile etc.)

Create an exciting story based upon your favourite minibeast. Think about stories you already know if you are not sure where to begin.

What to include in your story?

- Main character
- Setting
- Story structure beginning, juicy middle and ending.

<u>Understanding the World</u> (Science, History and Geography)

Find out about different minibeast's habitats and discuss why they live where they do.

Use the Minibeast sorting resource to put the minibeasts in the correct place based on their features

If you have outside space, can you design and build a bug hotel for your minibeast visitors!

Communication and Language

Minibeast memory game (minibeast names)

Children to draw pictures of different minibeasts on paper and turn face down.

'Deep, down and underground, I can see a ...(cute caterpillar)'

Children to turn over one card and finish the sentence. Children to repeat phrase

'Deep, down and underground, I can see a ... (wiggly worm...and a cute caterpillar)'

Each time – children to add another minibeast. How many can they remember altogether?

Creative (Music, Drama and Art)

Create a prop or puppet to help to retell your minibeast story.

Draw a wonderful minibeast picture! Think about the habitat they might live in for your background.
